The following recipe was requested by the membership.

Apricot Chicken Divine

4	Boneless - skinless chicken breast halves	½ tsp	Dijon Mustard
½ tsp	Salt		Cooking spray
¼ cup	Flour	¼ cup	Apricot preserves
¼ cup	Non-fat yogurt	2 tbsp	Slivered almonds (optional)

Spray bottom of a shallow 8 x 8 baking pan. Combine flour and salt in a plastic or paper bag; shake chicken in bag until well coated. Bake at 375° for 20 minutes. *Combine apricot preserves, mustard and yogurt; spread mixture on chicken and bake 20 more minutes or until done. If desired, just before serving, brown almonds lightly in oven then sprinkle over chicken. *Baking time could vary, depends on size of chicken breasts.

At Thanksgiving, a young woman decided that, rather than travel the 3,000 miles to her family home, she would volunteer at a local soup kitchen. She had never worked in soup kitchen before, nor had she ever met a homeless person. As Thanksgiving approached, she turned down several invitations to Thanksgiving dinner, announcing with a certain smugness he plans for the day.

But when she arrived at the soup kitchen on Thanksgiving morning, dressed in jeans and tee shirt, the director announced that, for the first time ever, they had more than twice the number of volunteers needed. The director thanked everyone for coming and added as a joke, "Of course you are invited to stay for dinner."

Everyone left for their own Thanksgiving dinner, -except her.

"Here you go, honey," said the woman serving turkey.

"But, I'm a volunteer. I'm not...," she said, but the woman was already serving the next person.

A pregnant woman was struggling to manage two plates of food and a toddler as she slid into chair. "It's good to sit down," the woman smiled. "You know how it is - this is the first time I've been able to eat in peace for days!" "I'll feed your son," she offered.

"Oh, would you, that's so kind."

"Well, actually, it's my job. I'm a volunteer."

"Oh," the woman's face clouded, and she ate quietly not saying anything else.

A father and his son then took places next to her.

"Daddy this is so good!" the boy said.

"Don't eat too fast, son." The father turned to her and explained the son's exuberance.

"It's been a good while since I could afford to give him a good meal like this one, you know."

"I'm a volunteer she said quickly." The father's face turned bright red as the air was filled with awkwardness.

"We got a volunteer in our class at school," the boy chimed in. "She sits right down at our table with us in school. She teaches us better than our teacher 'cause she's right at the same table, not way up in front of the room."

She stared at the happy little boy jabbing his plastic fork into the sweet potatoes. He had in his childlike way put his finger right on the heart of the matter. She had been so busy looking for differences between her and everyone else that she was acting as if the humanity surrounding her were a separate species. But were they so different? Hadn't she had job problems and troubled relationships? Didn't she have friends who were recovering alcoholics? And what about her own young niece who was already the mother of a toddler and an infant? There was nothing about these people at the Thanksgiving dinner that made them less than worthy of her care and love. She, the self-righteous volunteer, was really the guest - the welcomed guest - at *their* table.

The last Sunday of the Church year honors Christ the King whose kingdom knows no boundaries nor walls, neither castes nor classes. Christ is the King whose rule is one of service, whose power is compassion, whose scepter is humility. Christ is the King whose court belongs to the poor, the forgotten, the lost and the despairing. Christ is the King whose coin is forgiveness and reconciliation.
