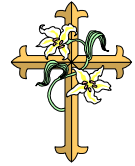

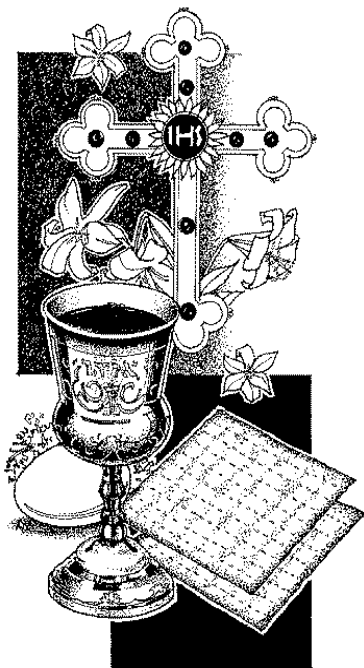

## FROM THE CHAPLAIN July 2005:

*+Taking the five loaves and two fish, and looking up to heaven, Jesus said the blessing, broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, who in turn gave them to the crowds.....Matthew 14:13-21*



During the Vietnam War, American prisoners at the infamous Hanoi Hilton prison survived the isolation and torture of the place because of two codes—the honor code and the “tap” code.

The Vietnamese never mastered the “tap” code, a code for communicating with one another between the prison walls. The code laid out the alphabet on a simple 5 x 5 grid (omitting the letter K for which C was used). The first tap indicated the row on line on the grid. The next tap the position of the letter on that line; for example, the letter B would be tap, tap-tap. The letter M would be tap-tap-tap, tap-tap. Americans who survived the Hanoi Hilton say the prison sounded like, “a flock of runaway woodpeckers.”

The code flowed so fluently that men told jokes; kicks on the wall meant a laugh.

Every Sunday, in coded signals, the men stood and recited The Lords Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance.

*(Time July 19, 1999)*

*Through a simple pattern of taps against a wall, a group of isolated POWs established a community. With a few pieces of bread and some fish Jesus established a Communion, a community, among that multitude on the Galilean hillside.*

*Through the Bread and the Wine of Eucharist, Christ continues to establish a community among us who gather at Mass to hear His Word.*

*This Gospel of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes is the only one of Jesus' miracles recounted in all four Gospel, it is just that important. This Gospel was especially cherished by the early church. It was the “code” and the “message” of the Sacrament of Eucharist. The Eucharist continues to unite us as a Church, to bring the message to this still faithful community of the Risen One. The Eucharist is what we are to become. We are to become what we receive, for the sake of others in our generosity, compassion and work for peace, reconciliation and justice.*

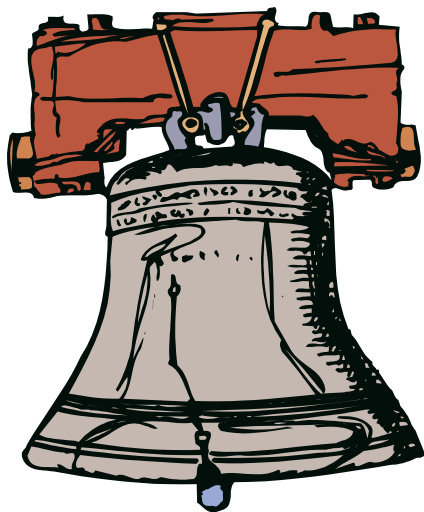
